


Dear Parents/Guardians





As a school there are many sporting, dance and musical successes we are proud of, but the most significant success, is the continued academic high achievements of the senior students.





As indicated on the roll based graphs above, Manurewa High School is tracking at or above the national average in Year 11 and 12, Numeracy and Literacy. This is a tremendous achievement. It shows that it does not matter what decile we are, the size of the school, what cultural groups we are, what national standards the students enter the school with, we can achieve at or above the national average. This has been achieved by teachers, students and parents working together. The improvement over the years has followed the very good attendance of parents at the student achievement conferences.



In 2015, we have another project that will allow more students to achieve and also increase the number of merits and excellences. Our results show that the students do not perform well in assessments which require them to write well-constructed sentences and essays.

Writing well is fundamental to achieving merits and excellences and also to gain success in Level 3. Our students need to learn to write well, not just to benefit their time at school, but also for the years after they leave Manurewa High School. We want them to be well equipped, whatever their career choice, to make the most of their life decisions.

We are going to introduce the award-winning 'Write that Essay' academic writing programme by providing training for staff and students. Developed by New Zealand academic and educator Dr Ian Hunter, the programme is an exciting combination of online writing tools, and classroom strategies. All students will be provided training in how to use this online writing programme. For further information I encourage you to visit the website www.writethatessay.org.

One of the benefits of the online site is that you as a parent can work with your child on writing assignments. You can view many of the videos on the site and discover more about what is expected in modern subject writing.

We will hold a parent evening in Term 2 and have Dr Hunter present. It will be an evening when you can come and hear more about writing well, and how your child can improve their writing skills.

Student and teacher training will be held during February, please get involved with this programme – with your support – it will make a difference.

Looking forward to working with you to continue to make Manurewa High School and its students contribute a significant part in society. I hope you enjoy reading this newsletter.

Asia New Zealand Foundation trip to Japan

On 21 March I will fly out, along with seven other teachers from across New Zealand, to Japan as part of a fully funded, week long trip courtesy of the Asia New Zealand Foundation.

The Asia New Zealand Foundation is a non-partisan and non-profit organisation dedicated to building New Zealanders' knowledge and understanding of Asia.

As participant teachers, we are expected to use this experience to develop strategies to include Asia in our teaching, and to support the development of 'Asia Awareness' throughout our schools within our own fields (physics in my own case). We will be in a position to help identify key skills that young New Zealanders need to be ready to be part of a workforce ready to deal with Asia in scientific and economic terms.

Once we return we will each submit a report outlining what we have learned and how we plan to promote and develop Asia awareness within our schools. We will also be available to discuss our experiences with colleagues both within and beyond our geographical areas. In addition, each of us will be creating a new teaching unit that draws on our experience of the Science and Technology industry in Japan and passes this knowledge onto our students. These units will be shared via the Foundation's website and e-newsletter.

Hence, this trip will be a huge learning curve for us as teacher-participants, with a considerable amount of work associated. But the chance to visit the Japanese space programme and robotics centres, to ride and investigate maglev trains, to see earthquake building technologies in situ and the opportunity to learn more about all aspects of Japanese culture and technology should make all the extra work worthwhile! LEARNER LICENCE – Special Offer If your child is 16 years old and currently in Year 12, we are offering after school tuition to assist them in attaining a learner driving licence at a reduced cost. We have been running these classes for two years and have evidence to prove that this extra tuition dramatically improves a student's ability to pass the AA test. Students need to register at the School Board Office by paying \$50.00 (half-price).

Classes will run after school Fridays from 2.30-3.30pm and students must attend the classes for a minimum of four sessions. Numbers are capped at 40 students per programme. The first class commences on Friday 27 February.

Student Success

Two of our Year 12 students from 2014 who were successful in passing NCEA Level 2 with Excellence, have also been recognised for their achievement by First Foundation which is a unique educational trust founded to give young New Zealanders a hand up to tertiary education.

.. a few words from Mele Tapueluelu

In partnership with the US Embassy New Zealand and US Embassy Australia, World Learning and its US. community partners (World Learning) hosted eighteen high school students and three adult participants from Australia and New Zealand for a three-week educational exchange opportunity.

I was lucky enough to be one of the eighteen high school students selected to be a part of this exchange programme. The primary themes for the exchange programme were based on civic education (citizen participation, grassroots democracy, and rule of law), community service and youth leadership development. The secondary theme for the exchange programme was based on Environmental issues and climate change.

The program began with a Leadership/Orientation segment at Zephyr Point on Lake Tahoe, where we took part in activities in teambuilding, leadership, global issues, environmental simulations and civic education workshops. We then divided into smaller groups for a host community segment to include a World Learning Global Leader Education and Engagement (GLEE) Institute in Portland, Oregon and Seattle, Washington. The host community segment also included volunteering, home stays and cultural events. I was a part of the group that went to Portland Oregon and I stayed with a fun and amazing host family. We were hosted by the world affairs council and had such an inspiring time in Portland. Finally, the group reunited in Washington DC for a Synthesis Workshop to make action plans for follow-on activities. These activities enabled us to promptly apply what we have learnt in our own schools and communities. Overall this once in a life time experience was challenging yet memorable and humbling. I enjoyed my time representing my country and I also want to encourage everyone to be motivated in everything that they desire to do and dream big!
