Dear Parents/Guardians

As we approach the end of Term 2 there have been many fine successes as you will read in this newsletter. One such success is this year's school production, High School Musical. It was unfortunate that I could not attend but I extend my congratulations to the students and staff involved as I have had reports that all performances were amazing, a sell-out and very well received by the crowd—well done.



In a recent assembly I addressed senior students about the feedback I have received from recent graduates of Manurewa High School who are now studying at University. These students have reflected that they did not do enough study at home while at school and that effected their performance in external examinations. It is the one area they had to improve to achieve at University.

This is an important message for our school. Your role as a parent is to help with supervision of this activity. Senior students must devote at least an hour after school for further study. This habit is best formed in the junior school. For further guidelines on homework please see overleaf.

As a school, one of our values is excellence – a measure of this is to develop leadership within staff and students.

It is with regret that at the end of Term 2 we farewell Mr Phil Muir who has been on the staff since 1996. Phil has been appointed to the leadership of the Westmount Education Programme. During his 19 years' service Phil has:

- taught a wide range of subjects—English, Automotive, Tourism, Integrated Learning, Social Sciences, Sport Leadership, Digital Technology, Technology, Careers and Transition, First Aid, Financial Literacy, Services preparation and Customer Service.
- Undertaken many leadership positions.
- Chaired ACATE for two years (Auckland Career and Transition Educators), National Executive for CATE one year (Career and Transition Education), held position of Deputy Principal at Manurewa High School since 2009, chaired the Manurewa - Papakura Youth Guarantee Governance Group and the Auckland Deputy Principals Association.
- Developed many programmes at Manurewa High School.
- Responsible for five HALP trips to SE Asia, Duke of Edinburgh for two years, started girls rugby and coached both boys and girls, Chess Club, Liaison officer between the school and NZQA.

This is an amazing list of contributions which the school is very grateful for and will find it hard to replace. I personally thank Phil for his support and hard work since I started in 2010. I admire his ability to make meaningful and strong connections in and out of the school.

We remember Mr Paul Lees

The glorious 35 year reign of the Emperor Richard Paul Lees as an educator at Manurewa High School crossed over two centuries, spanning more than three decades beginning in 1980 until part way through term 1 2015.

A very special service was held at school on Friday 12 June to pay tribute to Mr Lees, where many students and staff spoke of the man who inspired them. At the end a powerful haka boomed out for him - a touch the Roman emperor side of Paul would have loved.

Known by many as Caesar, Paul championed all students from the highest performing, intellectually capable, through to those who struggle with basics. He worked equally hard with all his subjects. Scholarship 2014 – extremely hard and shows his commitment to challenging and extending students.

A particularly memorable adventure he led was in 1989 – Emperor Lees' Odyssey to Turkey, Greece and Italy – taking a large group of students to the cradle of civilization and leaving at the height of the first gulf war.

Student voice has been loud and so respectful. Some of the hundreds of comments include the following:

"RIP Mr Lees. Your passion for Classical Studies shone through in your teaching and you never gave up on your students. Thank you for being such a supportive and wonderful teacher."

"So sad to hear this, he was such a positive influence on my life and the reason I am currently doing a PhD in Classics"

"He was an awesome teacher. Always ready with a quick witted retort. He was passionate and funny. R.I.P Mr Lees thank you for making all our lives that much brighter for knowing you."

"Very sad news. Mr Lees was a huge part of our lives and we will miss him hugely.



What is homework?

Studies on homework at high school level have found that it has clear benefits. Homework teaches children how to take responsibility for tasks and how to work independently. That is, homework helps children develop habits of mind that will serve them well as they proceed through school and, indeed, through life. Specifically, homework helps children learn how to plan and organise tasks, manage time, make choices and problem solve—all skills that contribute to effective functioning in the adult world of work and families.

Strategies to Make Homework Go More Smoothly

There are two key strategies parents can draw on to reduce homework hassles. The first is to establish clear routines around homework, including when and where homework gets done and setting up daily schedules for homework. The second is to build in rewards or incentives to use with children for whom "good grades" is not a sufficient reward for doing homework.

Homework Routines

By establishing daily routines for homework completion, you will not only make homework go more smoothly, but you will also be fostering a sense of order that your child can apply to later in life, including college and work.

Step 1 Find a location in the house where homework will be done

The right location will depend on your child and the culture of your family.

Step 2 Establish a homework time

Your child should get in the habit of doing homework at the same time every day. The time may vary depending on the individual child.

Step 3 Establish a daily homework schedule

Never accept the claim that there is no homework. Each term all students are given a dairy to keep track of their work. There is always review of lessons, preparation for next lessons, more practice of reading or practice of essay writing that can be done during the homework time.

Computers in Homes

This is a programme supported by the Ministry of Education which gives support to families who do not have a computer in their homes.

To be included in this programme a family must:

- Not have a computer in their home (though they may have tablets and phones)
- Be prepared to undertake 10 sessions of training in Term 3 (these will be 2 hours a session)
- Pay \$50

The programme will provide:

- Free training
- A computer
- An internet connection
- Technical support
- Mentoring training after the computers have been installed
- Access to online educational resources

It means a family will get better access to the internet, email and basic computer skills which will enhance the performance of the students in their studies.

Three enterprises progress through Dragon's Den

From food, to bathroom fizz and furniture, a diverse group of enterprises from Manurewa High School have progressed through the first round of the Young Enterprise competition.

The Dragon's Den style event required groups to pitch their business ideas and present business plans to a judging panel. The next step is a regional final which takes place this month. The businesses are:

- Pivot Point Solutions, which upcycles old-style school desks. The idea for the desk came from one of the student executives, who was concerned that she did not have space for a desk in her bedroom, which she shares with two others. The collapsible desk can fit under her bed, and is designed so that she can study from her bed. By creating a better study environment, the aim is for more students to be successful in education, and for fewer young people to end up in a pathway to NEET (Not in Employment, Education or Training). The students are very excited to be in the formative stages of a partnership with the new Integration Facility at Wiri.
- Scentopia New Zealand introducing the 'bon bomb': making fun with science, this group is developing a range of 'bon-bomb' products for use in foot and hand baths.
- Cambodian Sauce Company introducing 'wowzest': For the first time in New Zealand, this spicy Cambodian sauce is being developed with mentoring from global celebrity chef Sean Connolly.

Bollywood Rockerz Dance Comp

The competition was held at the Logan Campbell Centre at the ASB show grounds, and our students were keen to uphold their success in previous years.

NCEA Student App has been officially launched

Free NCEA Student App has been finally launched to help students track their NCEA credit progress and set goals for their NCEA achievement.

The **NCEA Student App** provides an officially maintained data base of standards and a goal-setting function. Students are encouraged to look at all the apps available and use the one that suits them.

The NCEA Student App will help students, parents, schools and whānau track learning progress and encourage excellence. All content is available in English and Te Reo Māori.

The NCEA Student App functionality makes it possible for students to:

- Create a record of the subjects and standards that they are studying
- Select and set their NCEA credit goals and targets
- See how they are tracking towards NCEA Levels one, two and three, including Literacy, Numeracy and University Entrance (UE)
- Set reminders for each standard—such as when assignments are due
- Capture results as they are achieved and cross check with the school or NZOA
- Personalise with information such as their NSN number or details about a course or standard (such as the teacher's name or timetabled classroom)
- Customise with different colour coding options and the ability to add photos
- Use in English and Te Reo Māori.

The App has a standalone database with a powerful search engine which allows students to easily find NCEA courses and standards that they are doing, or would like to do, and to set and track achievement goals.

The NCEA Student App is free to download from the Apple App store and the Google Play Store.

Mrs Colyer does it again!



Science teacher Mrs Fenella Colyer is no stranger to awards and recently she added another prestigious trophy to her cabinet.

Mrs Colyer was nominated for the Ministry for Youth Development Awards, established to acknowledge those who help to promote youth achievement in their community through any means, eg drama, culture, sports, education. Fenella's award was for her services to education and was presented to her by the Minister for Youth Development.

Mrs Colyer is an exceptional teacher who has previously won the Prime Minister's Award for teaching. Her motivational abilities have resulted in unprecedented numbers of Maori and Pasifika students entering extra-curricular science opportunities such as Science Fair, Next Young Engineer, Space Camp, Women in Science Conference, Science and Innovation Symposium, National Science Forum and The Sir Paul Callaghan Science Orators Competition.

To help students gain funding to attend these opportunities, Mrs Colyer established relationships with Rotary, gaining three awards for "Significant and Meritorious service to the Community" and assisting many students to attend events.

School Health Centre
