Dear Parents/Guardians

As the 2015 school year is reaching a conclusion I reflect on how it has been a very special year in many ways with so many tremendous performances. Over the last few weeks we have held Prizegivings for Arts, Sports, Maori, Year 11 and Year 12. Congratulations to all the students who were recognised in these events. I am in no doubt that 2015 has been one of the best years at Manurewa High School.

It was also great to have past students making contact. An example of this was the recent 90's Alumni reunion initiated by Marcus Winter and Kareem Brown. Well done Aaron Lew—a great achievement and to do that in the same term as winning the right to represent New Zealand at the World Future Problem Solving competition—shows a lot of talent.

This month involves a combination of:


- Completing work for 2015 including final assessments for NCEA and assessments for Year 9 and Year 10. It is important that junior students take these end of year tests seriously. Staff are writing final reports which will be issued on Tuesday 8 December.

Next year there will be a change to how student leadership will be managed. Future Problem Solvers into the world finals



Okesene Fatu, Aimee Lew, Aaron Lew and John Chen (pictured above) came 2nd in the national final (middle school section) ensuring them an invitation to the Future Problem Solvers world finals in the United States to be held at the Michigan State University in June 2016.

The problem they faced was related to Human Enhancement, focusing on therapeutic enhancements such as artificial limbs. The challenge required them to research the topic, communicate their understanding in a formal submission, and then do a dramatic presentation of what they had learned.

They were the only group to be named a finalist for both their submission and their presentation.

Proud principal Salvatore Gargiulo says the students were completely self-directed and distinguished themselves from other schools in their approach. "A lot focused on how to ensure individual access to human enhancements. Our students focused on ensuring shared access for everyone."

Aimee says they enjoyed learning about the topic and the ethics of artificial limbs. "We thought about how enhancements blur the lines between human and inhuman. Some people say that technically, you become a cyborg. We also considered - do you actually need the enhancement, or do you want it?"

Participating in a number of challenges this year, Aimee says the programme has developed her knowledge of the world and current events, and her skills in working under time pressure. It's also helped all of the students to learn to be self-critical and work together as a team. "At the start we were a bit too sensitive towards each other, but once we learned each other's strengths and weaknesses, we really began to work well as a team."

The Future Problem Solving Programme develops critical and creative thinking skills, encourages students to have a vision for the future and prepares them for leadership roles. Manurewa High School has become involved for the first time this year and its success is unique for a school without any experience of the programme. Mr Gargiulo credits both the students and their coach, Glenis Martin, for their achievement.

Artist Lisa Reihana visit to MHS

Manurewa High School was very privileged to have multi-media, photography and sculpture artist Lisa Reihana (Nga Puhi) come and talk to the year 12 and 13 art students during Art week 2015.

She discussed with our students her times in art school (1980s), the industry in the past and how it was particularly challenging for Maori and Pasifika people to break through into the field. The likes of *Maori Television*, *Tangata Pasifika* and several great masters helped to pave the way for Maori and Pasifika people today. Lisa discussed the opportunities that are out there for youth if they want to seize it. She shared with the students how she began and where she is at present.

The students were captivated by her work and discourse. They asked questions that they thought related to their current work, cross-disciplines and future potentiality. Some senior art students had been fortunate to have made a trip to the Auckland Art gallery prior to her visit, in which they saw her work in its full glory. It has been reviewed as a cultural phenomenon – 49,000 visitors— making it the gallery's most popular show by a NZ artist, live or dead, since 1997.



Lisa was impressed with her attentive audience and the questions they asked. Some students were very inspired by this artist talk. Here's hoping that in the future, Lisa Reihana will be able to return to Manurewa High School and discuss this latter art experience with our students.
