I am delighted that Pete Jones has been appointed to replace me. He has been an integral part of the success that the school has achieved in and out of the classroom over the last few years. He has an incredible amount of energy and will take the school to a whole new level.

The development of a programme where university students who recently attended Manurewa High School are coming back to the school to talk with current students and pass on their learnings from their short journey has a really important message. It is the need to do work at home.

They have found that students they are attending university with have a fixed routine of doing revision, readings and assignments at home. They claim that this has been the case for their entire secondary school. This is a major challenge for the school. Families must be prepared to set aside a space and time where students put their phones away and do some schoolwork. The "we don't have any" is not acceptable. There is always personal reading that can be undertaken. If we want to improve the quality of our grades, this is an essential step for all our students.

Lastly, there are two very pleasing aspects of term 1 to report on;

- the attendance rate is over 90% which maintains the improving trend; if you are not in class, you are not learning.
- the successes in sport and cultural participation showing that with the right work ethic we can achieve at the highest level.

Financial education in Manurewa High School

Young people are growing up in an increasingly complex world where they will need to take charge of their own financial future.

Young people are often economically active online at a young age, using parents' credit cards for purchases, and may have responsibility for mobile phone contracts. At the same time, these products and services are becoming more complicated, choices are more difficult, and some important financial decisions are being made much younger than by previous generations.

In June 2009, the Commission formally handed responsibility for the teaching and learning of financial capability in New Zealand schools to the Ministry of Education. We support the Ministry's work and the development of quality financial education resources for use in schools.

Financial capability is highlighted in the New Zealand Curriculum as an example of the type of theme that schools could use for effective cross-curricular teaching and learning programmes.

Fight Rheumatic Fever

Manurewa High School Health Centre runs a *free* sore throat Clinic. If a student has a sore throat, they are advised to come to get it checked for 'strep throat' which can lead to rheumatic fever and rheumatic heart disease if left untreated. If your Tamariki have a sore throat, encourage them to see the School Nurse for a free throat swab. All throat swabs and medication are free and medication will only be given to your child if you have agreed to it. The nurse will also tell your Doctor if your child is given antibiotics to take.
