48 Hour Film Competition Update



Welcome parents to the regular series of information bites around eLearning. Social media is becoming a big part of our kids lives. Used properly it can be a great tool to connect friends and family members. Below are a set of guidelines to help with social media in the home.

The golden rule of social media – protect your identity.

- Advise your child or children to avoid using their real name as their username in social media, at least until they're old enough to manage their own identity safely.
- Make sure you and they both know not to share locations when sharing pictures. Many smartphone Apps will try to do this automatically.
- Teach them not to accept followers they don't know. Social networking (for younger children, especially) should be about connecting with friends not amassing followers.
- Check and re-check that everyone knows how to find and use the privacy controls provided with each site or App.
- 3 great guidelines for enjoying Social Media:
 - 1. Kindness: Teach kids to be kind online. Remind them to think about how the other person might feel. It's also good to discuss what they should do if they come across others being cruel or doing anything that doesn't feel right. Cyber bullying ends when bystanders become upstanders.
 - 2. Sharing: Kids should also be aware that photos they send of themselves can be forwarded and saved. Remind them that if they are sharing photos of other people, they should think about how that might make the other person feel and should ask permission first. It's also crucial to make clear to children what type of information should not be shared on social media, including their address, school, phone number or email address.
 - 3. Content: For kids who are media savvy and have their own blog or even YouTube channel, remember that online seldom means private. They should automatically assume that anyone they write about will one day read their words or watch their videos so no mean comments about teachers, parents, friends or schoolmates. Remind them that everything they put online is there forever.

NZTA—Class 1 Driver Licence NCEA Credits

The NZ Class 1 Driver Licence unit standards are now available to students. Credits from these standards can count towards learner's achievement of NCEA and other qualifications on the NZQF.

- Learn to drive a vehicle within the conditions of a Class 1 NZ learner driver licence (Level 1, 2 credits)
- Drive a vehicle within the conditions of a Class 1 NZ restricted driver licence (Level 2, 4 credits)
- Drive a vehicle within the conditions of a Class 1 NZ <u>full</u> <u>driver licence</u> (Level 2, 2 credits)

Once a student has gained their Class 1 Driver Licence they can be awarded these standards and gain credits on their Record of Achievement through a "recognition of prior learning" process.

The students need to complete the **NZTA Class 1 Driver Licence** – **Recognition of Prior Learning form** from the Careers Department and bring in their official photographic licence.

Applications will be accepted after gaining the restricted driver licence and students will gain credits for both learner's and restricted driver licences. Students can also make their application for all three standards after gaining their full driver licence however the full driver licence can also be presented at a later date when it comes available to be awarded these standards.
