The golden rule of social media – protect your identity

Advise your child or children to avoid using their real name as their username in social media, at least until they're old enough to manage their own identity safely.

Make sure you and they both know not to share locations when sharing pictures. Many smartphone Apps will try to do this automatically.

Teach them not to accept followers they don't know. Social networking (for younger children, especially) should be about connecting with friends – not amassing followers.

Check and re-check that everyone knows how to find and use the privacy controls provided with each site or App.

3 great guidelines for enjoying Social Media:

- Kindness: Teach kids to be kind online. Remind them to think about how the other person might feel.
- Sharing: Kids should also be aware that photos they send of themselves can be forwarded and saved.
- Content: For kids who are media savvy and have their own blog or even YouTube channel, remember that online seldom means private.

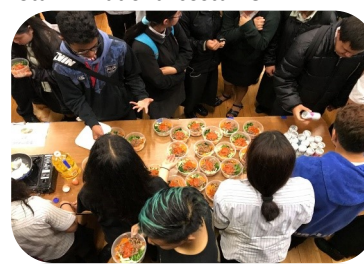


International Week

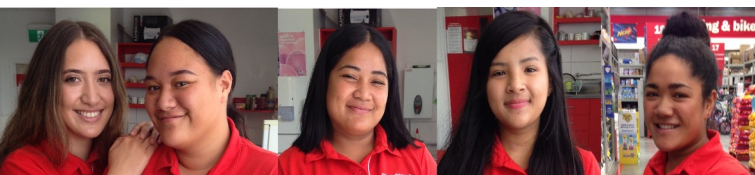
enjoyed the competitive group activities and the opportunity to mix with students from other secondary schools in East and South Auckland.

Learning about the food chain



Our food gardens are growing ever more productive thanks to a new composting system. Recently we installed worm farms and bokashi bins, which have been funded by Nestle Cambria Park. A group of ESC students is managing the worm farms, under the guidance of Environmental Council team member Mrs Louise Dreadon. The bokashi bins will be used to process food waste from the café, HAC kitchen, and the staff room. All this waste was once going out in the rubbish. Now it's being captured to grow food.

When Nestle representatives Gayleen Staunton (past student) and Nigel Dunchue visited, students were able to share what they've learned about feeding the worms only the right kind of food scraps.

Vegetable Gardens

In 2016 we were fortunate to receive a small grant from the Manurewa Local Board to enable us to establish the first of our vegetable gardens. In collaboration with the Trades Academy, planter boxes were built and then filled with fertile planting mix by the students of Hiranga ki te tonga. These students also grew corn and bean plants from seed. They planted these along with lettuce, rocket, and silverbeet amongst others to create a luscious selection of crops over the summer.



Scaffolders help our students on to career ladder

Housing New Zealand subcontractor SW Scaffolding is helping four Manurewa High School students take their first step on the career ladder.

The Wiri-based firm, which provides scaffolding for Housing New Zealand via Edwards & Hardy and Spencer Henshaw Ltd, has started a work placement pilot for the students who are all in their final year of school. Peletina Motuga, Josephert (JT) Tolofua, Sean Maireroa, Te Hiiringa (Te) Mareikura-Tane and Tua'a Slade have been involved in the initiative; two of the five school days each week the boys go to work with the company for the duration of the school year, the remainder of their week is at school to continue their studies.

The first four weeks of their placements are spent in the yard where their progress is monitored before they join one of the crews. Once they're familiar with the pace of work and what's required, they work with a training provider to help them gain unit standards and skill them up for the industry.



The arrangement arose after the school's Workplace Learning Co-ordinator, Neil Lawton, approached the company. Neil says the initiative offers the boys a great opportunity.

"These guys will probably go straight from school into full time employment. How good is that? The employers have been really positive and I work with a great bunch of kids. It's great seeing them getting on."

School Health Centre

The Health Centre is staffed by three full time registered nurses—Tracey, Leanne and Paula. Open 8.30am—3.30pm Monday—Friday. The nurses are an integral part of the Student Support Services and provide a confidential and culturally safe service to all students.

Fight Rheumatic Fever

Manurewa High School Health Centre runs a *free* sore throat Clinic. If a student has a sore throat, they are advised to come and be checked for ‘strep throat’, which untreated can lead to rheumatic fever and rheumatic heart disease. If your Tamariki have a sore throat, encourage them to see the School Nurse for a throat swab— all swabs and medication are *free*. Medication will only be given to your child if you have agreed to it. The nurse will also tell your Doctor if your child is given antibiotics to take.

If you DO NOT want your Tamariki to have a throat swab taken at school, please phone the School Nurse on 269 0690 Ext 205.
