Cecilia co-founded 'My Food Bag five' years ago, about the same time she was having her first baby. The business concept is to help people cook a healthy dinner, by doing the shopping and delivering the food to your door.

She came up with the idea after seeing it in action in Sweden. She and her business partners had a goal to have revenue of \$30 million in three years. They nailed it.

So that's an entrepreneur — someone who solves a problem through a business, or in Cecilia's words:

"If you see yourself as one, then you are one.

"If you've got a lot of craziness, that's good.

"If you manage risk well, that's good too."

Cecilia met with our students after giving her talk. She thinks it's important more young people learn about being an entrepreneur, because at some stage in their lives, knowing how to run a business could be a useful lifestyle choice.

Wednesday 21st March my colleagues - Josh, Abraham and I attended the EY Launch evening. It was mind blowing meeting all these successful and ambitious people. Getting to know entrepreneurs in their 30's was amazing because seeing how much they have already accomplished throughout their lives gave me the right push to keep "aiming high and strive for excellence." I learned all about the importance of planning and goal setting to get to where I want to be and that anything is possible if I believe in myself. It was truly an amazing experience.

My Story

Hi my name is Linda. I'm 16 years old, from Germany, and I've spent the first term of this year at MHS as an international student. I guess before I came here my expectations of New Zealand, which is known as the most beautiful country on earth (at least



that's what people at home say!), were pretty high. Still, almost every single one of those expectations has been far exceeded! These three months alone, far away from home, have been the best time of my life so far. All these open, kind and loving people, their colourful cultures, and the magnificent landscapes are so different from everything I've known from home and I cannot put into words how much I've

grown, experienced, and learnt throughout my time here.

Manurewa High School Health Centre runs a free sore throat Clinic. If a student has a sore throat, they are advised to come and be checked for 'strep throat', which untreated can lead to rheumatic fever and rheumatic heart disease. If your Tamariki have a sore throat, encourage them to see the School Nurse for a throat swab—all swabs and medication are free. Medication will only be given to your child if you have agreed to it. The nurse will also tell your Doctor if your child is given antibiotics to take.


