 - It needs to be something that gets you up in the morning – PIKI ATU KI TE RANGI
 - “I want to help South Auckland kids smash through the Education System”
 - “I want to end homelessness”

7 Principles of Solutions Focussed Coaching

- 1. You don't have to understand the cause of the problem to solve it*
- 2. There is no such thing as never and always*
- 3. If something works do more of it*
- 4. If something does not work, stop it*
- 5. Great changes come from small steps*
- 6. People are wonderfully resourced*
- 7. Give praise and acknowledge success*
