Pathway to Employment

General Information

Level 2 Courses

Level 2 Students should hopefully have a career in mind when selecting courses. Make sure that the courses you choose allow you to follow the career pathway you would like. All students study up to five (5) courses or a package of courses. Eg: Trades Academy option. If choosing individual courses, select 5 courses as your preferred choices and one course as your back up.

- University Entrance literacy credits can be found in a range of courses, not just English (check course posters carefully for specific details).
- A Year 12 student may undertake a multilevel course with some standards at both Level 1 and 2.
- There are a wide range of courses available at Level 2 so students should carefully consider which courses lead to their future pathway including specific Level 3 courses, University or Tertiary courses.

National Certificate of Educational Achievement – Level 2

Students need to gain 80 credits, 60 from Level 2 or above plus 20 from any level.

General Information

Level 3 Courses

Level 3 students should have a career in mind and an idea of where they want to go when they leave school e.g. a tertiary course, apprenticeship training or straight into paid employment. Make sure that the courses you choose allow you to get to where you want to go next.

All students study **five** courses or a package of courses Eg. Trades Academy. If choosing individual courses select 5 courses as your preferred choices and one course as your backup.

- There are no compulsory courses.
- Students choose five courses from any level.

Level 3 NCEA courses are made up of both internal and external assessments.

In some cases, where students in Year 13 have not yet achieved Level 2 NCEA, they may decide to study a combination of Level 2 courses to complete this certificate and Level 3 courses so that they also work towards achieving Level 3 NCEA. There is also an opportunity to study a course which will offer a combination of Level 2 and 3 credits.

Scholarship Exams – A separate Scholarship exam will be offered for students to sit if they desire in a range of learning areas.

National Certificate Unit Standards - Students who successfully complete National Certificate Unit Standards will have them recorded on their Record of Learning.

Entry requirements for University are detailed on page 35.

Note: For entry requirements for specific providers please check with Careers.

National Certificate of Educational Achievement – Level 3

Students will need to gain 80 credits, 60 from Level 3 or above plus 20 from Level 2 or above.

Level Endorsement - Merit or Excellence

Obtained if 50 Merit and/or Excellence credits are achieved.

Course Endorsement – Merit(M) or Excellence(E)

Merit Endorsement – 14 credits (at least 3 external) at M or E.

Excellence Endorsement – 14 credits (at least 3 external) at E.

Level 3 TEF – CAN TAKE 03TEF OR 03HAC

Exemptions

Students may be granted more than 1 course exemption after following the process of Careers and HOLA consultation.

What does this course lead to?

Study the learning area Posters where each course leads. You need to be sure that the course you select leads on to the further education and career pathway you want to follow.

University Entrance at Level 3?

You need to be sure that the courses you select are UE approved and you fully understand the entrance requirements of the course you want to get into and the university you would like to go to.

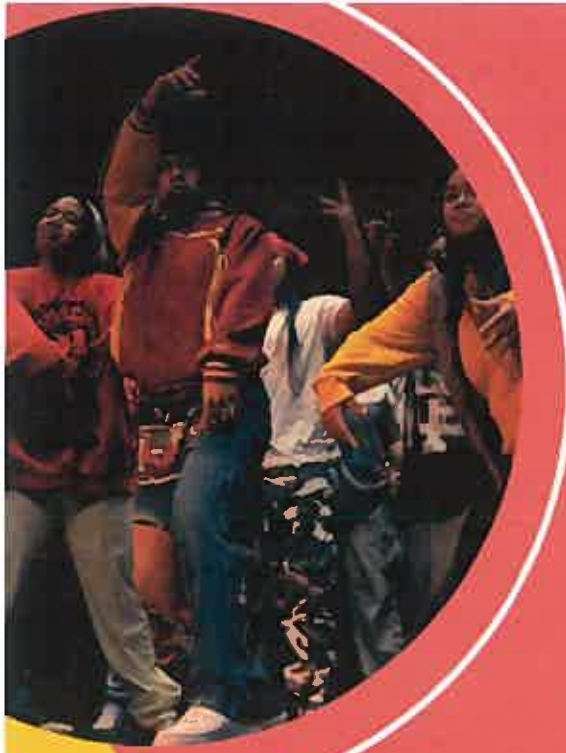

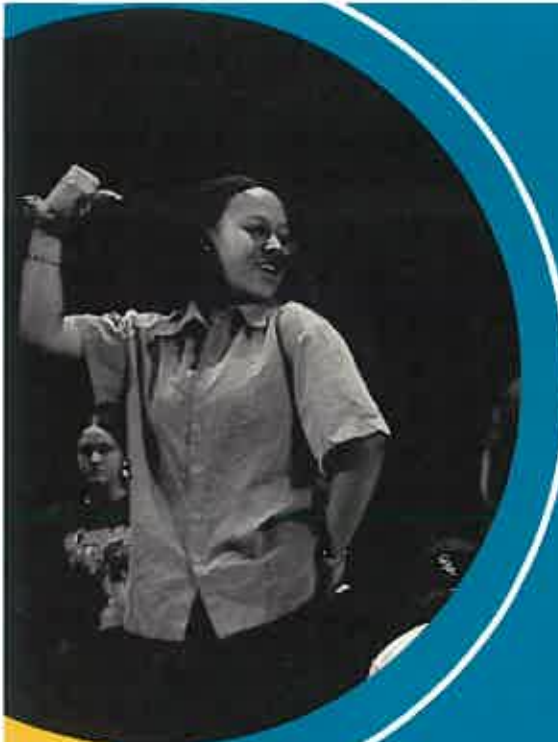

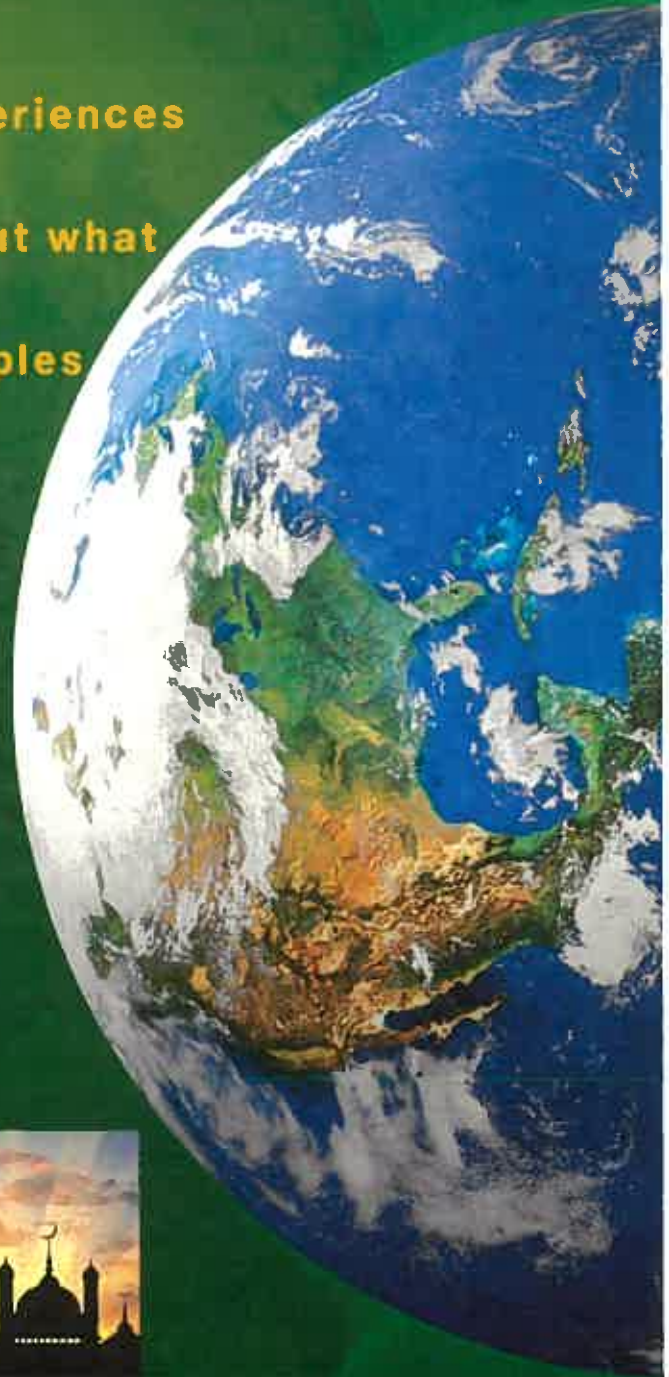

LEVEL 3: U.E. APPROVED SUBJECT

In this course we will:

- Share our expertise and experiences from our own religion.
- Ask questions and learn about what other people believe.
- Visit religious sites like temples and churches.
- Develop our cultural intelligence, curiosity and critical thinking skills.



English Language Learners

(ELL)



Students cannot choose these courses. Students are selected by ELL Team.

This subject is for students who **have arrived in New Zealand, in the last 5 years and for whom English is not their first language.**

Our GOAL is to support our ELL students with their English Language learning and assist them to transit to mainstream classes smoothly so they can be successful in other subjects and ultimately their life pathway.

Reception Course

Classes are for students who **arrive new to NZ with minimal English language knowledge.** If they are senior students they may be offered Level 1 EL Unit Standards to help them gain NCEA Level 1.

Junior Courses

When junior students **reach 85% of stage 3** they are released from ELL support.

09ELL

Year 9 course is taught through topics to develop successful speaking, reading, writing and listening skills, and are related to the mainstream curriculum.

The topics are **NZ Heritage, Natural Disasters, Endangered Species and Myths & Legends.**

10ELL

Year 10 course is taught through topics to develop successful speaking, reading, writing and listening skills, and are related to the mainstream curriculum.

The topics are **Poetry, Film Studies, Who Am I This Year, Short Stories and Multi Media News.**

Senior Courses

ELL courses are **not UE accredited courses.**

Senior students must **gain 85% of stage 4** in order to be released from ELL support classes.

01ELLENG

Year 11 students can gain **14 English Achievement Standards** plus **5 EL Unit Standards credits** and develop their English language skills of Speaking, Reading, Writing and Listening.

The units of work are the same as are taught in English classes.

01ELL

Year 11 students can gain **25 EL Unit Standard credits** towards NCEA Level 1 and develop their English language skills of Speaking, Reading, Writing and Listening.

02ELL

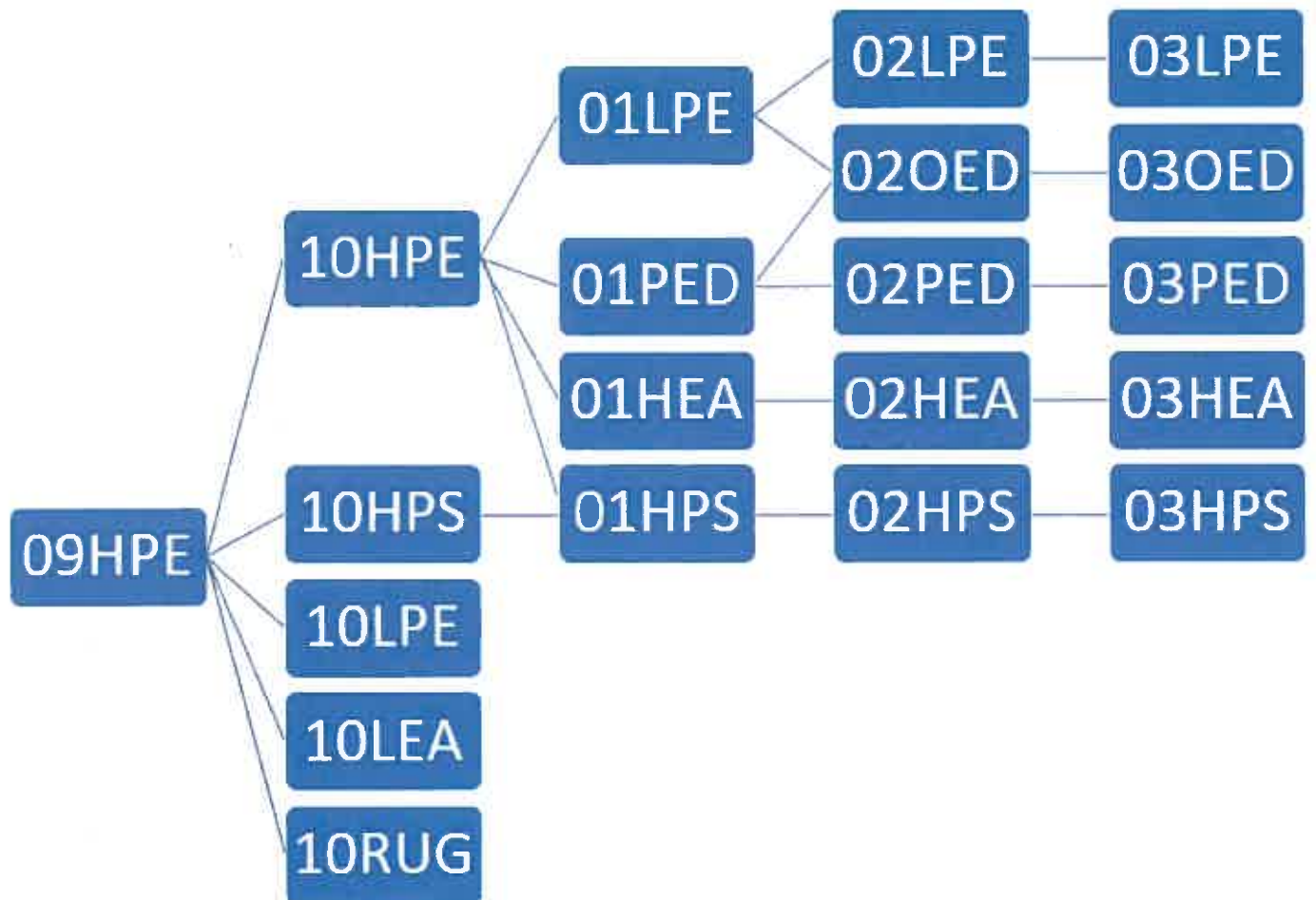

Credits gained through Te Waharoa can also be counted towards obtaining NCEA Level 1, Level 2 and Level 3 qualifications.

The course will be made up of Mau rākau (maori weaponry). Credit attainment will be under the authority of Te Whare ū Laua, a nationally recognized and accredited programme founded by Dr Pita Sharples, incorporating Te Reo Māori, Haurua and Tikanga Māori. 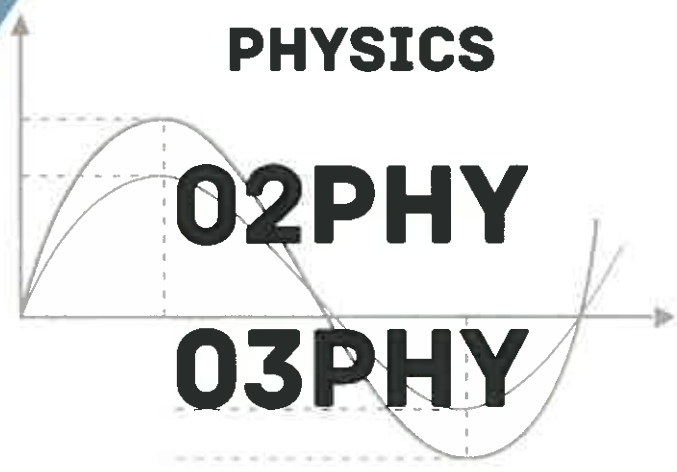
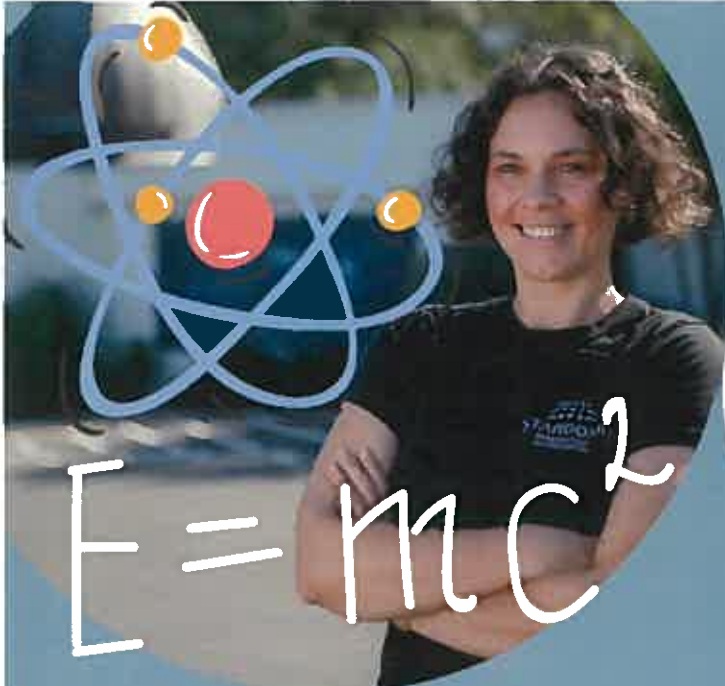
COURSE DESCRIPTION

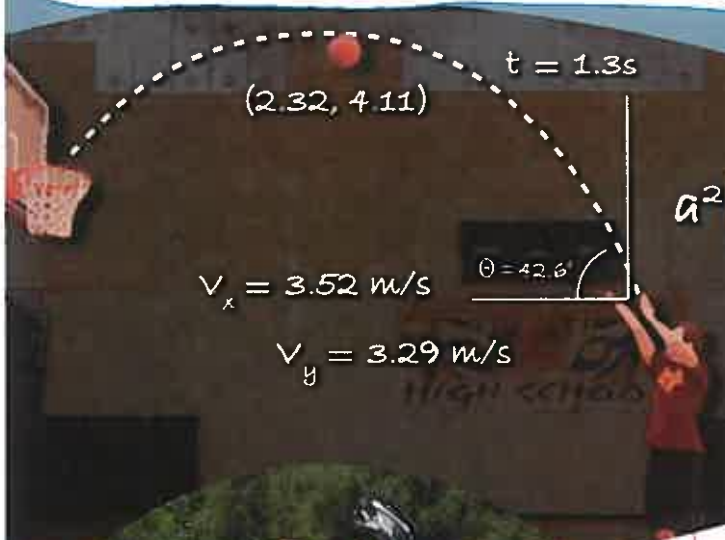

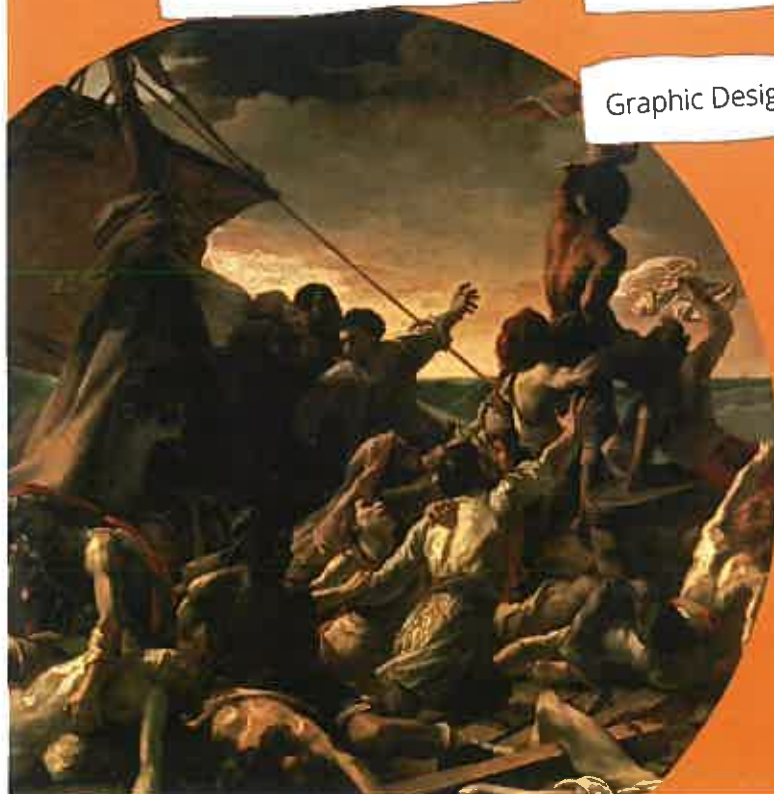

Classics encourages us to make links between the present and the ancient past. In this course we study Oedipus, a Greek tragedy which sees a young king murder his father and marry his mother, in an attempt to avoid his fate. We study aspects of our own cultures such as tangihanga, and the role of the matai, which we then compare to the ideas and values of Classical Greece. In this course we also look at Leonidas and his 300 Spartans as part of Greek warfare, and how this led to the building of the Athenian Empire.

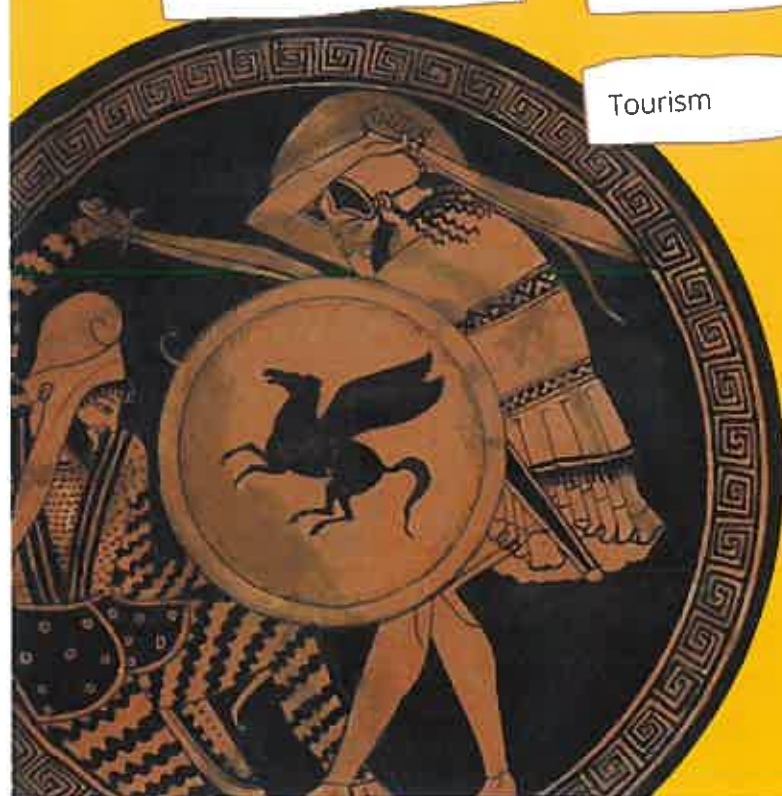

In this course we study the Ancient Greek Hero and how this has influenced other time periods. We look at the madness of Heracles, the piety of Aeneas, and the heroism of Katniss Everdeen. We also look at Plato's philosophies surrounding the different forms of love, and the dangers of a lack of education. In the external exams we look at the messages communicated in Greek and Roman art, and the Greek tragedy, Antigone, in which a young woman must decide which is more important – her loyalty to her family, or to her city state.

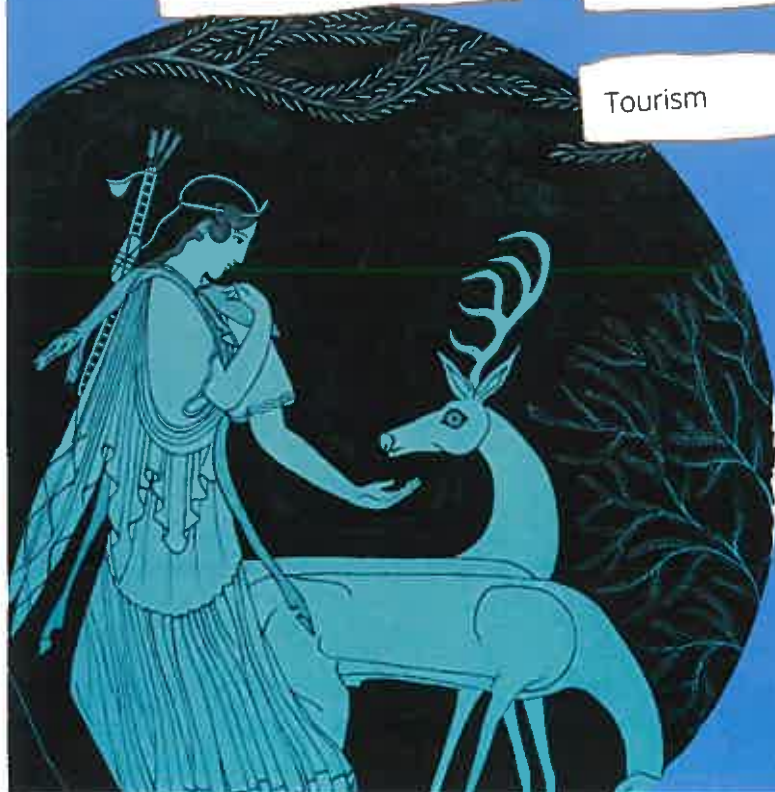

GEOGRAPHY



IF YOU LOVE FIELD TRIPS - YOU WILL LOVE GEOGRAPHY.

Geography focuses on how people interact with the natural and cultural world's that they inhabit.

Geographers are involved in creating real world solutions to real world problems such as climate change and viewing the world in a balanced way.

L1 Geography (01GEO)

If you take L1 Geography - you will go on a field trip to Goat Island Marine Reserve north of Auckland. You will study what impacts fishing has on Aotearoa's marine environment and use Google Earth to create a mock volcanic eruption in Tamaki-Makaurau. Level 1 Geography offers 18 credits.



L2 Geography (02GEO)

If you take L2 Geography - you will go on a field trip to Tongariro National Park, study the global pattern of mountains and evaluate the pros and cons of a proposed rail link between Auckland City and Auckland International Airport. Level 2 Geography offers 19 credits.

L3 Geography (03GEO)

If you take L3 Geography, you will go on a field trip to Rotorua, study the planning involved in the ASB Polyfest, the effects of mass tourism, and how the cultural process of tourism operates in Rotorua. Level 3 Geography offers 19 credits and is UE approved and has both reading and writing credits.

The Civil Rights Movement

The Civil Rights topic develops students' understanding of racism in the USA, allowing them to better understand modern conflict surrounding race in the USA today. We explore a range of events in the Civil Rights Movement and their connection to the Black Lives Matter Movement today.



The 1981 Springbok Tour

The 1981 Springbok Tour saw some of the largest, most violent and divisive protests that our country has ever witnessed. We investigate the conflict caused by the 1981 Springbok Rugby Tour. Students will investigate the history of apartheid in South Africa and will assess different people's perspectives on the tour at the time.



The Invasion of Waikato

The Invasion of Waikato is arguably the most defining conflict in New Zealand's history. From the creation of the Great South Road to the confiscation of Maori land (Raupatu), we will explore what caused the Waikato Invasion to happen and the legacy it continues to have. The recent protests at Humea are explicitly connected to this history and are key to understanding what is going on there today.

What does Year 12 History look like?



Protest: Mau Movement or Parihaka

The year begins by examining the Invasion of Waikato and the Saramau Mau Movement. Students are given the choice to do research on either one of these historical events, as part of the first internal assessment.

The Dawn Raids

Social Revolution will be explored as students begin to explore the role of the Polynesian Pioneer movement in 1970's New Zealand, a time when minority communities were actively persecuted based on the colour of their skin. The topic is accompanied by a guest visit by the Polynesian Pioneer Association to learn about their perspective on this dark chapter of New Zealand history.



The Vietnam War

Our external topic focuses on the national revolution of the Vietnamese as they struggled against the might of the United States during the Vietnam War. Students will learn about colonisation in South East Asia, the ideologies of the Cold War and the legacy the war itself continues to have today. The topic continues to explore the ideas of unity and independence against oppressive forces.

What does Year 13 History look like?

Heke and the flagstaff

The year begins with students exploring the colonisation of New Zealand with an in-depth look at the rebellion of Hone Heke when the flagstaff flying over Kororarua (modern day Russell) was cut down, sparking the first of the New Zealand Wars. This topic involves an incredible camp where we go to the Bay of Islands to explore many of the sites where this history occurred first hand.



The Atomic Bomb

For this topic, students will focus on the controversial decision to drop the atomic bomb on Hiroshima in Japan in 1945. The class will explore the Pacific theatre of World War II and develop an understanding of the brutality of the war itself. The assessment for this topic asks students to analyse the different perspectives of historians on this event as well as showcase their own opinion on the use of the bomb.



The Stolen Generation

Our external topic moves back to our focus on colonisation, this time taking our students to Australia. Students will investigate the hardships suffered by the Aboriginal people at the hands of the British and will compare the experiences of colonisation of both Maori and indigenous Australians. Students will also explore modern protest for indigenous rights in Australia and its connection to other protest movements.

03PAC: Gain 20 credits by examining the history and origins of the Samoan Tatau, Climate Change in the Pacific and the history of slavery in the Pacific - Blackbirding. This is not a UE approved subject.

02PAC: Gain 18 credits by exploring kava ceremonies across different Pacific cultures, the Gender Pay Gap and the Dawn Raids. Students taking this course can also gain 5 reading, 5 writing credits (UE literacy).

What's TCE?

This is a great introductory course that can be used to explore future course choices in the Technology and Trades Academy Learning Areas. The course covers both Construction (woodwork and Engineering (metalswork)) therefore increasing your option choices for Level 2 courses. This is a practical based course and credits are gained by successfully completing theory booklets. Students will complete 2-3 projects or builds which will help them develop the necessary skills in TCE and help them on their Trades pathway; they can also keep the product they make.

What's TCE?

This course follows on from 01TCE and is a natural progression in terms of the degree of difficulty, the level of skill and the standard of the expected outcome produced. It continues to develop the students interest in both Construction and Engineering. Students will learn how to use a range of power tools and hand tools to build projects which can be taken home or built.
