Dear Parents / Guardians


It was a very special day on Friday 2 May as our kaumātua Bobby Clark from the Manurewa Marae blessed the ground before construction began on our new whare wananga on our current tennis courts at the front of the school. The development completes a long term commitment from the Board of Trustees to replace the old prefabricated whare located in the South Eastern corner of the school. Although the Eastern boundary was once earmarked as a second entrance to the school council plans never eventuated, meaning that the whare was inappropriately hidden in a far corner of the school - a situation that was never ideal and has been a priority for the school to rectify for some time. With the development of the new whare wananga (house of learning) at the front of the school we have taken the opportunity to realign the driveway and car park and create new astro turf netball, tennis and basketball courts— artists impression of plans overleaf. Development will take place in two stages and we hope it will all be completed by mid-2015. Please be patient as we work through some logistical issues with car-parking during this time.



As the weather gets colder we often see a decline in student attendance. Simply put, students cannot learn if they are not in class. Each dot on the graph below represents one year 11 student from 2013 and plots their attendance compared to the number of level 1 credits they gained across the year. You can

clearly see that students that have over 90% attendance are almost guaranteed success in NCEA. The same pattern can be seen at year 12 and 13. I believe that attendance is the greatest factor affecting student achievement not only at Manurewa High School, but across the country. Please assist us as a school by reiterating this at home and encouraging your children to take every learning opportunity made available to them.

We know that the cold weather presents some challenges for families as they struggle to purchase warmer uniform items - often resulting in



students becoming unwell. There are circumstances in which the school and/or other services can assist with uniform items. Please do not hesitate to ask for support by contacting the Whanau Tutor or Whanau Leader of your child, or by contacting our student support services.

Geography Department Update



Term 1 was eventful for Geography with fieldwork trips undertaken at all levels. We had our first trip to Goat Island Marine Reserve in Leigh, where Level 1 students found out about the sustainability of New Zealand's marine waters; students enjoyed talks from the Leigh Marine Discovery Centre, snorkelling and a trip on the glass bottom boat. Level 3 also experienced a beautiful day at the beach at Muriwai; studying coastal processes, and finishing the day with a barbecue kindly prepared by some Level 3 HAC students.



Our Level 2 students once again spent an informative week at Tongariro National Park, with 47 students completing the Tongariro crossing. The majority of the 64 students who were there desired to complete the crossing, but due to the weather not being ideal, a health and safety decision was made and only those of a certain level of fitness were allowed to go past the 'saddle', our turn-back point. The students all felt a tremendous sense of achievement completing New Zealand's most walked and famous track, with the weather clearing for lunch and a beautiful view of the lakes.

On all trips the students worked well together and once again represented our school well in the field.

Four students from our Student Health Council (Ba-Phi Pham, Allissa Paras, Tommy Tran and Lyndal Sekene) attended the North Island SADD (Students Against Drug Driving) Conference in Napier in the school holidays from 29 April—1 May. The conference was about empowering students to be the best influencers, leaders and change-makers, so that youth can create and drive the change needed in terms of lowering the road crash numbers. The students got to network with others from all around the North Island. They have come back with some fresh, exciting ideas about what they can do within our school and community.

Youth Health Council Fono

Eleven Year 11 students from our Student Health Council attended a fono run by Youthline on Thursday 8 May 2014. The focus of the fono was empowering students with ideas and strategies about how to run a youth health council within school. They spent the day networking with students from other schools, listening to speakers from organisations like Youthline and the Heart Foundation about how these organisations can support schools, and planning events that could be held at Manurewa High School. Student Health Council empowers young people to take control of and improve their own

health. It encourages them to take active steps to be positive leaders of change in their school and community.



Auckland University Young Engineers Competition

In April Miss Hou and Mrs Colyer went along with two teams of year 13 students to take part in the Auckland University Young Engineers competition, involving 22 teams from a range of schools.

It was, once again, clear that when it came to working with their hands and solving and presenting problems creatively, our students were very strong. In the competition where the challenge was to build a wind resistant structure from everyday materials, one of our teams came first—Naeem Mirranay, Kenny Zhou, Adhitiyan Krishnamoorthy, Caleb Davies. In the main event involving finding a creative way to problem solve around an earthquake, and a presentation that was creative and cost effective—our other team came first, with a score of 94% - Daniel Blakeborough, Prinesh Chand, Shaedon Cullen and Garion Gleeson.

NZQA Fees must be paid to the school Business Centre before 1 September 2014

Students must pay their fees to have their results recorded on their Record of Achievement, and to receive certificates.

There are separate *fee structures* for domestic students and international students. *Financial assistance* is available for domestic students to help with the payment of entry fees. Financial assistance is not available to international fee-paying students.

Basic Fees for 2014 (incl GST):

- Domestic student entry for all NCEA standards and 3 scholarship subjects—\$76.7o.
- International student entry to NCEA standards—\$383.30. The school has no control over fees we only collect them for NZQA. If you miss this date you will have to pay a late fee of \$50 on top of the standard fee—please do not delay.

If you have a Community Services Card bring it when making the payment to the school Business Centre—this automatically qualifies for a discounted rate.
