Dear Parents / Caregivers

It is with gratitude and appreciation that I return to Manurewa High School for Term 3. Being granted sabbatical leave from the Ministry of Education has awarded me a special time to reflect, to consider and to promote to schools around the world, what is important in achieving success and how it can be improved.

Upon my return I spent a day with a group of the Manurewa students at a leadership forum hosted by AUT

during the holidays. It was good to catch up with them on their progress. I was delighted to hear feedback from this group of students about how the school had progressed well during my absence. I am very grateful to Daniel Wilson and the staff for ensuring the school maintained the high standards of engagement and performance during Term 2. An important message from the student leadership forum was the need to spread leadership.



From the research I have undertaken into what makes a successful school, I am convinced the three areas that Manurewa High School puts a lot of effort into are fundamental to success.

- 1. Good connections between parents, the school and the students. Our continued rate of over 85% attendance by parent/caregivers at Student Achievement Conferences is a crucial part of our programme.
- 2. Having a range of curriculum pathways that gives every student a chance to follow their passion and abilities. We are fortunate in New Zealand to have a curriculum which allows for students to pathway to university or into trades. With the development of the Trades Academies, there is now even better connection with careers and further training.
- 3. An extensive co-curricular programme which allows students to be able to take part in out of school activities such as sport and performance. This enriches the experience of school for many students.

Our leavers' data shows us that 70% of the leavers achieve Level 2 or better. If the students remain through to Year 13, it is 95% who achieve Level 2 or better. This is a record we should be very proud of, it does outline that success is possible for nearly all of our students.

We do have to work on the 17% who leave with no qualifications. The data shows these students have poor attendance, they are often transitory, they do not take part in the co-curricular programme and they are less likely to attend the Student Achievement Conferences. The challenge is for our whole school community to identify and support this group.

While it was great to have had the chance to travel, I am looking forward to returning to the challenge associated with working at a successful and forward looking school while maintaining its culture of enjoyment and success.

Parent/Caregiver to email or bring in a letter to say why student will be absent and for how long.


Signing out for appointment?

Otago University Hand's on Science Week

Aimee Scott writes . . . I had the amazing honour of recently going to Otago University's Hands-on Science week. I was flown down to Dunedin and spent a week in the dorms, going to lectures and conducting experiments in their labs. There were many different science projects running, such as pharmacy,



using an infrared camera by Aimee Scott

biology, psychology and many more. I went into the physics project which focused on climate based physics. On the first day we looked at climate models from Christchurch and compared the changes over the years and learnt about infrared cameras. On day two, we used devices such as frequency generators and oscilloscope to learn more about resonant frequency and how carbon dioxide molecules re-admit light in random directions, just liked wires can emit sound. We measured radiation at short and long wave lengths on the third day and visited the second coldest

room in the southern hemisphere. On the last day we looked at all our research and watched videos on climate physics, helping us understand what we had done over the week.

TVNZ's Masterchef Judge, Simon Gault will join the judging panel for the final of the National Secondary Schools Culinary Challenge at MIT in September. Gault was one of four judges for the Auckland regional challenge where eight secondary school teams competed in a 90-minute Masterchef style cook-off for just one spot in the Nationals. Simon Gault told the students that he was "seriously impressed" and compared them to the select few who have done it on TV, "it was better than many make on Masterchef, you guys are on fire". Long Bay College won by two points. Manurewa High School students, Bupphe Lam and Daniel Wu accumulated 90 points to take second place and were the only other culinary team to receive a Gold Medal.

Silicon Valley Business Innovation and Technology Experience trip to Silicon Valley

In the July holidays we had five students visit Silicon Valley as part of an eighteen person trip to understand how Silicon Valley works. The trip was put together by Mr Andrew Patterson, a prominent media business correspondent who is also deeply interested in education.



Andrew's idea was to take a group of motivated students, who are interested in business and/or technology to see and meet with the people and companies that make great things happen. Where possible there were kiwi connections.

The group's first visit was to Khan Academy – the free, online school that serves millions of self-learning students. They provide a "tool that lets students take control of their own learning" and recognise that for most students they just need more time to work through and understand topics and concepts, and their method provides this. We would assume that such an online school would cut down on the amount of interaction between people – but no, their goal is to increase human interaction, which they do very effectively. Khan is a very dynamic, fast moving company that has the mind set of "we're going to do it, no matter what".

The team spent time at Google, and saw how they work and their unique nature. Google is a company that turns over \$55 billion per



year – massive. Victoria Ransom, one of New Zealand's ICT business success stories gave the advice to "have a great team and create an amazing place to work". They also visited Facebook, having a tour and a session with kiwi Vaughan Smith – who is in charge of getting Facebook into China – a huge undertaking. Their goal is to lay the foundation for a more personalised world.

The group also visited Microsoft, Renaissance Leadership, Xero, IDEO Design School, Apple, the Kiwi Landing Pad and Stanford University. At Stanford they met and heard about Manurewa High School ex-student (and Head Boy) Graeme Fielder – who is currently studying his MBA there. His advice for success is simple – "just do stuff". Great advice which the students really understood.

The group learned about the culture and visions of some of the world's biggest and most famous companies. The trip was a life changing opportunity, and one which will be with them for life – and they have pledged to spread their learning, advice and newfound networks. The group consisted of Justin Walker, Shweta Sharma, Lynna Son, Timothy Dreadon, Jordan Ngata, Mrs E O'Riordan and Mr P Muir.

BUSINESS CENTRE UPDATE

Last term a kiosk was installed in the Business Centre to allow senior students to put credit onto their ID cards for use at the new Café. In the near future the kiosk will also be able to accept payments for student fees and we are also working towards having the facility on line through the parent portal to allow parents to pay for fees through the website. This facility will also allow parents to top up students credit for printing, café purchases or fees/ stationery. We will let you know when it is available. Students who currently have credit balances on their accounts will not be able to use this at the kiosk, but can use it at the Business Centre as per normal.

NZQA fees are due for payment by 1 September 2014. Remember to bring in your community services card, if you have one, which reduces the fee from \$76.70 to \$20.00. We must sight the card in order for this reduction to apply. NZQA apply a late fee of an extra \$20 if fees are not paid **before** 1 September 2014.
