Dear Parents and Guardians

Term 1 2012 would rate as one of the most challenging that I have had in my 19 years of leading schools. To operate with no staffroom and 25 classrooms out of action has put stress on staff and students.

It has been a measure of the resilience of staff and students that despite working under such pressure the programmes in and out of the classroom have been maintained with a high standard of work being achieved.

We know that significant improvement in the school's academic performance is due to the high attendance of parents at Student Achievement Conferences over the last two years. Students who have an interview with their parents achieve significantly better results than students who do not. Therefore it is most important that you make the effort to attend a student's academic conference with your child on the 10 or 11 May. While a time will be allocated to you, if this does not suit then contact the school to establish another time.

Recently I had the privilege of being able to spend time with the schools Touch, Waka Ama and Volleyball teams. It was special to be able to get to know these groups of students and share in the challenges they faced and the success they achieved. The students must give huge thanks to the staff who give up their time to work with them in these activities.

Each group represented the school well and were acknowledged in each case by staff from other schools as polite and pleasant students. I was delighted with their manner and their successes.

The message these students can teach all students to achieve success in school work is:

- Good preparation these teams have been training hard all term
- Learning from mistakes it is fine to make mistakes but not to make the same repeatedly
- You have to work hard to succeed at the highest level
- Following instructions these teams had very good coaches but that is only useful if their instructions are being followed
- While working hard it is important to maintain a sense of fun and teamwork.

The same process was followed by the Polyfest groups who all performed well with the Samoan group achieving outstanding results.

Many of our students achieve at the highest level in sport and performance. We also must keep in mind though that it is through academic success that your child will open up opportunities for career and employment.

Careers Update

University of Auckland - 4 Step Engineering Programme

Forty Maori and Pacific students from years 11-13 who are currently studying Mathematics and Physics attended a one hour presentation by student mentors from the MAPTES scheme, (Maori and Pacific Targeted Entry Scheme) University of Auckland on Monday 19 March. Although the focus of the presentation was to present information and encourage students to consider studying the Bachelor of Engineering (Hons) degree, our students were also persuaded to work hard at school to maximise their future career opportunities. The sessions were fast paced and inspirational, with our students being given relevant information on how to set academic goals to get in to a university course of their choice. This session will be followed up with another visit in term 3 this year.

SADD 2012 National Conference - MHS wins the Challenge

Hakim Ahmad-Ali, 13ASO and Tai Semisi,13TLZ attended the 4 day national Students Against Drink Driving (SADD) conference in Napier and were on the team that took out the prize for the conference challenge. The theme of this year's conference was Social Change – Significant alteration over time in behaviour patterns and cultural values and norms. The conference was a meeting of over 60 different schools who each sent 2 or 3 delegates, 122 girls and 23 boys in total. Hakim Ahmad-Ali writes: 'The challenge was very broad and full of possibilities, to create a new SADD campaign to make a significant change within NZ teen drink driving statistics. These stats show that in the decade since 2002 there 700 teens have died on our roads. The financial cost of this is over 1.05 billion dollars, not to mention the effect on families and friends which is immeasurable. The group's winning idea was 'Stand Up, For Me'.

They created a punchy marketing campaign and a promotional event called 'Stomp for Lyfe' which will be used during SADD week. Overall the experience was exciting, although not overly multicultural with only 4 people of nationality other than European, something we need to work to change over the coming years. It showed us the big idea, issue and how we could solve it.'. Well done to Hakim and Tai and we look forward to their return to school to share their knowledge and lead our local group to making our society a safer place to live in.

Sports Update

Touch

One of the challenges that confronts us all at Manurewa High School is to achieve good academic results while at the same time maintaining our enthusiasm, energy and excellence in cultural performance and sporting areas. During Term 1 a group of students worked together under the coaching of Malcolm Davis assisted by daughter Charlotte to continue the schools outstanding achievements in touch. They formed a mixed team to first win the counties competition by beating Alfriston College, they then played in the Auckland zone. This is a very tough fought zone. To qualify for the nationals at the end of the year they needed to be placed in the top 3 teams. This meant they had to play Macleans College in the semi final—they played very well to defeat them 4 - 1. Given that Macleans has won the nationals mixed for the last two years, this was a great achievement. The team then went on to beat Mt Albert Grammar 4-3 in the final. Another great achievement. The team will be preparing for the nationals where they hold a proud record of Manurewa placing 3rd place in 2009, 1st in 2010 and 5th in 2011. Volleyball Nationals

A very competitive season for both teams, playing 8 rounds of double header games for the premier season with the Premier Boys placing 3rd and the Premier Girls placing 4th overall. Both Premier teams competed at Volleyball Auckland Champs held at Trust Stadium, Waitakere playing a maximum of 3 games per day throughout the 3 day tournament—both teams placed 7th out of 24 in Auckland. Volleyball Nationals were held in Palmerston North where teams all over the country competed against the best of the best from each region. Waka Ama Nationals

Manurewa High School took down a crew of 19 boys and 6 girls to Rotorua to compete at the Waka Ama Nationals Tournament. All crews competed in the 250m and 500m race, the top 6 boys and 6 girls of the whole squad then paddled together in a race called 'Double Hull' where they placed 4th in the champion final. U19 Boys A (Team Gold) placed 4th in the 250m Champ Semi and placed 1st in the 500m, winning the Plate Final, U19 Boys B (Team Green) placed 5th in the 250m Champ Semi and 2nd in the 500m Plate Final, U16 Junior Boys placed 5th in the 250m and 500m Plate Final and last but not least the U19 girls placed 4th in the 250M Plate Final and 4th in the 500m Champ Final just missing out on a medal! We were up against 89 other schools, over 2000 paddlers who race for club teams as well as NZ National Teams so these results are truly testament to how hard our teams worked when they were racing alongside the best—congratualtions.

Out of the 48 students that competed at the Counties Manukau Athletics Zones, 17 students made the qualifying times to compete at the Greater Auckland Athletics Champs. These students were up against club and national reps. Outstanding competitors – Ryan Asalele placed 10th in Intermediate Boys Long Jump, Andrew Robins placed 11th in Senior Boys Long Jump and 7th in the 400m race, Kelly Stewart placed 12th in Senior Girls Long Jump and 5th in High Jump, Richard Mariota placed 6th in the Senior Boys Javelin with an impressive throw of 43.94m.

Manurewa High School student and plus-two handicapper from Manukau Golf Club Nick Voke has been away at golf tournaments more than he has been home. Nick is working hard to increase

his golfing development to ensure the best possible chance of success. Recently he came 18th in the South Island Strokeplay in Christchurch, he then travelled to Invercargill to play in the South Island Invitational where he equaled the course record in the first round with a 64 and finished 4th overall. Hamilton saw Nick finish 19th in the North Island Strokeplay. In the biggest amateur event that New Zealand holds, the New Zealand Strokeplay held in Hastings, he shared the lead in the first round and finished 16th. Nick is still a student and is

My first few months as Education and Pacific Island Affair's Minister has started with a strong desire to work collaboratively to raise Pasifika and Maori achievement. The Pacific population is the fastest naturally-growing population in New Zealand. It is estimated that one in 10 people in New Zealand will be of Pacific descent by 2026.

We must have a shared concern for current statistics that show high Pasifika youth unemployment, and generally low skilled Pasifika employment. These statistics will only change when Pasifika educational success is at the same or similar levels to all other New Zealanders. With strong educational achievement come better life chances and better life choices. We all want better lives for ourselves, for our families, and for our communities. An excellent education is the launching pad for that better life.

I encourage you all at Manurewa High School to work collaboratively to help our Māori and Pasifika students raise their educational achievement. Collaboration across the community is vital to this – that means teachers, principals, unions, parents, communities, businesses, academia and government agencies working together, taking responsibility and sharing ideas that will turn successful teaching practice into common practice for all our students.

We know we have caring parents, grandparents, families, whanau, aiga. And so we want to shift the gear to a new level and ask everyone to step up and show up to make sure that our students are getting the best for their future.

The quality of teaching and learning must rise too. NCEA 1, 2, 3 and university entrance passes are essential for students to gain meaningful jobs or further training. The school is responsible for this.

Outside of the school what are we responsible for?

Parents and grandparents, family, whānau and aiga are responsible for supporting our students to do well by:

- 1. Expecting the best of and for them
- 2. Believing that they will do well
- 3. Ensuring that they go to school with breakfast inside them
- Being at school when the bell goes in the morning and there until it goes in the afternoon, Monday to Friday
- Requiring respectful behavior at school so that teachers can concentrate on teaching
- 6. Supporting them to get their school work done

I grew up in a family of 8 children, in the small rural settlement of Ruatoria, and was educated at the local play centre, primary school, and college - all Decile 1. Being Maori, being from a low socio-economic community, being rural and isolated, being a girl - none of these condemn any of us to a second class education or life journey. With a strong family and whanau who held high expectations and recognition of the importance of education, together with teachers who understood that my success was their success, I have had better chances and choices then I would otherwise have had.

It's my job, and yours, to make the possibilities real.

Whether you are a student, teacher, principal, union, parent or anyone in the community — we all need to ask ourselves — what can I do to take on personal responsibility of lifting achievement in our community?

During your term break, I urge you to put some thought into turning all the positive aspects of Manurewa High School with its cultural richness into significantly increased achievement by all students, and by our large Māori and Pacific student body. Be safe over the break!
