Dear Parents / Guardians

The end of term 2 also sees the completion of the refurbishment of what was the A to D block of classrooms involving 25 classrooms, the hall and the staffroom. It has been a major disruption for the school over the first two terms of this year. I have been most impressed with the tolerance, the resilience and the patience of the staff and students. The new block will operate from the start of term 3. There will be an official opening on 27July and on 28 July there will be an open day for parents, past students and the community to be able to tour the new block and see first-hand the significant difference that has been made to the building.

There has been a lot of discussion in the media about giving all students an equal opportunity to gain good jobs and good careers. I am convinced that there are many opportunities available to students at Manurewa High School. I see students working really hard in sporting, cultural and performance areas. The successes of these efforts are advertised in this newsletter and are continually reported on rewanet.

There is however a very important opportunity that more students should be taking, the chance to gain good qualifications. I was delighted that over 85% of parents attended the Student Achievement Conferences. The relationships developed between staff, students and parents is a major support for the success of students.

Term 3 has three very important events that will make a significant effect on the future of many students

- 1. Practice exams for year 11 to 13. Students need to take these seriously. As in sport and performance, not practicing results in poor performance. Please make sure your child does preparation by going through past papers and revising work that has been covered. Success in these examinations will allow for students to have better selections of subjects for next year.
- 2. Selecting options. Poorly selecting options can result in failure and/or reducing future career possibilities. The curriculum booklet will be published early in term 3. Spend time with your child looking carefully at the information that is in this important resource.
- 3. Another Student Achievement Conference to review the major 2012 report, set up the goals for the end of the year and confirm next year's option.

#### **NZQA Fees**

NZQA fees must be paid to the school Business Centre before 1 September 2012.

Students must pay their fees to have their results recorded on their Record of Achievement, and to receive certificates.

There are separate <u>fee structures</u> for domestic students and international students. <u>Financial assistance</u> is available for domestic students to help with the payment of entry fees. Financial assistance is not available to international fee-paying students.

#### Basic Fees for 2012 (incl GST):

- Domestic student entry for all NCEA standards and 3 scholarship subjects—\$76.70.
- International student entry to NCEA standards—\$383.30.

The school has no control over fees – we only collect them for NZQA. If you miss this date you will have to pay a late fee of \$50 on top of the standard fee—*please do not delay.* 

If you have a Community Services Card bring it when making the payment to the school Business Centre—this automatically qualifies for a discounted rate.

#### Tihei.... MAURI ORA!

This year Kahui Kaiako Māori (KKM) have initiated and organised for staff at Manurewa High School to take part in the twelve month, home based course provided by Te Wānanga o Aotearoa called Mauri Ora. Staff need to complete four journals in total and on completion will receive a Level 2 National Certificate in Māori. This course specifically looks at the views of Te Ao Māori and aims to create a foundation for cultural awareness and identity to broaden knowledge of New Zealand history. Currently we have over half our staff with 62 staff members partaking in the Mauri Ora programme. We are proud to say we have representatives from our school Board of Trustees, our Principal, Deputy Principals, Whānau Leaders, Head of Learning Areas, Teachers and Support Staff who are gaining a better understanding of kaupapa Māori. We then hope this will transform into staff developing a better understanding of our Māori students to form positive relationships and will help to increase student engagement and achievement.

Most staff have completed the first journal which covered Ngā Atua (Māori Gods), Powhiri, Tangihanga, Māori Birthdays and Weddings. The second journals looks to be more challenging where we will have to look more into how Māori manage the environment and their natural resources effectively. Several staff have already made contact with Bobby Clark, a local kaumatua from Manurewa Marae, to assist them with their knowledge and understanding in Journal 2. This is great and shows our staff making genuine links with our local marae, which is something the school has been trying to improve.

The mobile dental unit will be visiting Manurewa High School

#### 18 June—10 August 2012

The mobile unit will provide the following services:

- 1. Enrolment of students 13 years—under 18 years **who do not have a dentist** or choose to transfer to the service and who qualify for free dental care (some exceptions apply—orthodontic and oral surgery).
- Examine and asses students (including x-rays) unless otherwise advised.
- Develop dental treatment plans and treat accordingly. If treatment is unable to be completed while at school you will be notified by letter to make an appointment at Mahu Dental, Trust Health Care Medical Centre in Manurewa—phone 09 2682266 to make an appointment.
- Provide information, advice and feedback on good oral health habits.

#### The consent procedure:

The consent process will comply with the Health and Disability Commissioners Act 1994 and The Code of Health and Disability Services Consumers Rights 1996.

Students will be advised before enrolling that if they have a dentist, they will not be invited to enrol.

The consent form will be sent home seeking parental consent for students under the age of 16 before any treatment is carried out with clear instructions and options for treatment.



# **Discovery Learning Centre**

This year Manurewa High School has organised a special programme for Year 9 students in the Discovery Learning Centre which aims to meet their unique developmental needs.

## What is Discovery learning?

Developmentally responsive

Intellectually challenging

Socially responsible

Culturally relevant

Open ended

Voice uncovering

**Engaging** 

Real and relevant

Youth action projects



## Why discovery learning?

Firstly, young people require key competencies to navigate all the new technology and a life of constant change and increasing diversity that they are experiencing. They need to become CONCEPTUAL thinkers which is why we are INTEGRATING the curriculum. Schools are needed where students use information, skills and technologies to:

- · construct new knowledge,
- solve complex problems.
- integrate ideas and concepts across disciplines,
- · effectively communicate orally and in writing, and
- work in diverse groups.

Secondly, Year 9 and 10 students have different needs to Year 11, 12 and 13 students. The needs and characteristics of early adolescents involve the development of:

- a sense of identity and purpose,
- diversity of ideas and challenges –intellectual, emotional, physical, not bounded by subjects,
- social interaction with peers and adults,
- mastery, competency, achievement –and achievement progression,
- · meaningful participation in school and community,
- active & exploratory learning that involves physical activity,
- routines, support systems and structures which they help to devise,
- caring, affirming, supportive relationships with adults who are friendly but not friends,
- opportunities to lead, experience diverse styles and forms of leadership and develop as leaders.

Thirdly, to respect the tangata whenua of Manurewa the Discovery Learning Centre is situated within the broader school concept of Te Kotahitanga and students explore te reo and kaupapa maori. Finally, Manurewa is a culturally diverse community and we want to take advantage of this by relating learning to the cultural background and context of every student.

## How do we facilitate discovery learning?

Last year a team of eight teachers collaborated to design the new inquiry learning programme for the incoming Year 9s with Dr Pat Nolan from Massey University. In 2012 the three teachers in discovery collaboratively plan each week using a four dimensional integrative curriculum design. The design integrates into the curriculum personal concerns, social responsibility, the eight learning areas and the culture of the school. Students work in co-operative groups and are encouraged to explore and be creative. For example, they have learned to say their mihi, explore their whakapapa, diverse cultural patterns and the design process for kites.

Year 9s use the purpose built Discovery Learning Centre which has flexible teaching spaces for ninety students. Each day one whanau spends four hours undertaking critical inquiries. When possible they learn in real life environments. All Year 9 students have had the opportunity to visit the marae and learn about Manurewa from the kaitiaki and kaumatua of the marae. When appropriate they use the library, playing fields, and other school services and facilities. The students interact with the Youth Workers, nurse, senior leaders and other school staff whenever appropriate. The students continually use a range of digital devices, including desktop computers, laptops and iPads. The teachers collaborate with senior leaders and teachers throughout the school to ensure that the programme has a broad and solid foundation. Discovery learning aligns very closely with the New Zealand Curriculum.
